

COST OF S/N VS. SHELTERING

A 1998 national survey: Shelters spent an average of \$176 for each animal they impounded AND \$450 for each animal placed.

Financial Assistance Programs have been shown to reduce both intake and euthanasia rates at a cost of \$50-\$60 per animal.² Tinancial Assistance Programs cost much less per animal to achieve results than other types of programs, including those related to shelter/adoption solutions. Thile both types of programs drive down euthanasia rates, the difference is the costeffectiveness.



5 STRATEGIC PROGRAMS

- 1. SNAP program for limited-income pet owners \$25
- 2. Shelters & Rescue Groups FREE
- 3. Community Cats FREE
- 4. The Fix is IN! Mobile Clinic (Public Vet) Discounts are on a case-by-case basis
- 5. Pit Mix Fix \$10



1. SNAP SPAY/NEUTER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

- 1. Limited-income pet owners pay just \$25
- 2. Strays abound in low-income neighborhoods
- 3. SNAP helps get them fixed & stay with the people who love them!
- 4. People can grab a SNAP certificate every Monday morning (online)

STRAGEGY: PREVENTS SHELTER INTAKE



2. SHELTERS & RESCUE GROUPS

 We provide 10 FREE spay/neuters per year, minimum
Makes animals adoption ready
Helps rescue groups "pull" more animals from overcrowded shelters into foster homes
STRATEGY: PREVENT INTAKE & PULL SHELTER ANIMALS



SPAY/NEUTER BEFORE ADOPTION

2016 State Law: Requires Rescues & Shelters to Spay/Neuter Before Adoption

The bill did not provide funding

We are currently requesting an amendment to the State budget

What Are They?


-Feral & Free-Roaming Cats


-Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return (TNVR) & Eartip -"Colony Caretaker" (usually the person who was feeding the cat) continues to provide food & shelter

Strategy:

-Adding a Community Cat Program is the Quickest way to prevent shelter intake & become zero kill. -About 90% of these cats were euthanized in shelters. There's no demand for frightened cats.







4. UNIQUE PARTNERSHIP WITH PUBLIC VET



145 Cats Fixed in Terre Haute

The FIX is I

Mobile clinic for cats

They travel into remote counties (vet deserts)

In Indiana, there are some counties without a single vet!

\$90 Cost - Discounts provided on a case-by-case basis

- Pit Mixes & Large Dogs (50 pounds or more)
- Supply & Demand do not align
- \$10 Pilot Program Marion County
- Lawrence & Jackson Counties – Special Program

PIT MIX FIX

Rescue Groups can "pull" a limited number of Pit Mixes & Large Dogs before they become full

These dogs take longer to be adopted

Strategy: Spay/Neuter to Prevent Shelter Intake



CHALLENGES



While we were locked down, Community Cats partied like it was 1999!

Pandemic

-Vet offices were "nonessential"

- -PPE went to doctors & hospitals
- -Vet clinics were slow to reopen, slower procedures, curbside....
- -Shelters are now full (again)
- There's also a nationwide vet shortage

Funding

-Pet Friendly Services is a small nonprofit


- High demand for our spay/neuter certificates
- We sell out of SNAP each Monday

- -We don't receive any government funding















