





Service Provider Survey Results


The survey distributed to service providers was designed by the Indiana University School of Social Work and School of Medicine, Pediatrics in conjunction with the Indiana Department of Child Services (DCS) for the purpose of measuring the delivery of child welfare and probation services in Indiana. The service provider survey was distributed to all service providers with an active contract at the time the survey was distributed (Monday, August 3rd). The survey was distributed via email on 08/03/2015 and remained open until 08/21/2015. Providers were given instructions on how to complete the survey anonymously online. The survey included informed consent. The survey collected basic information from respondents, including: service provider role, type of service/s provided by respondent's specific agency, region/s provider serves and demographic information. Additionally, providers were asked to rank 26 services in terms of service need and availability when needed as well as service utilization and effectiveness when utilized.

Of the 460 providers who responded to the survey 133 self-reported as having the role of "Frontline Worker", 126 self-reported as having the role of "Program Manager", 54 self-reported as having the role of "Central Administrative Operations", 81 self-reported as having the role as "Agency CEO" and 66 self-reported as having the role of "Other".



In DCS Region 4, 47 total service providers opted to participate in the survey.







Biennial Public Hearing

October 8, 2015

1:30p

Regional Manager, Steve Scott opened the meeting and advised that the region specific goal that has been identified to be reviewed in this Biennial Plan would be issues surrounding emergency care for young children with severe behavioral needs.

Below is a summary of verbal testimony taken at this hearing:

Sara Kuhns, Whittington Family Services:

Identified Father Engagement Services and Substance Abuse treatment as areas that Whittington is able to provide services for. They can provide D & E's and have an HSPP and clinical staff available to sign off on evaluations.

Sherry Davis-Youth Service Bureau

Identified that they have Father Engagement Services and Emergency Care available to provide in the community. Expressed concern about substance abuse issues growing in the community and how DCS handles those issues. Disparity in cases.

Greg Merrick-Wells County Probation

Identified the following concerns in the community: Substance Abuse; Treatment options specifically in Wells county to address issues of heroin, spice and methamphetamines by juveniles. Concerns around truancy and school related issues.

Ed Graft-Gateway Family Services

Provides residential and foster care services to the Regions. Identified concerns expressed by potential foster parents regarding new licensing standards developed by DCS.

Page Hamilton/Jennifer-SCAN

Identified the most common areas that people seek assistance from SCAN services as financial assistance; assistance dealing with child behaviors; housing; employment. When families are referred to counseling services they either are not qualifying for Medicaid or they can't afford the co-pay for services.

Rachel Tobin-Smith—SCAN

A need is identified statewide and regionally for qualified therapists and staff. DCS requires the use of evidence based practice by providers but the lack of qualified therapists/staff limits a provider's availability to provide services. Suggests that Central Office work with Workforce Development to focus public attention on lack of qualified staff and educational ways that persons can become qualified to provide services. Also suggests that DCS service standards continue to change as with the requirements.

Kendra-Allen County Probation Department

Identified a need for secure facilities and treatment for mentally ill kids; training for parents of children with mental health needs; short term detox services for children; ABA counseling; that Teen Parenting and Father Engagement services for DCS also be opened to Probation referrals; Victim Sex Abuse Specific services; Thinking Error and Status offender programs; Drug/Alcohol Tx for parents available to probation referrals in addition to DCS referrals.

Ann-Allen County Probation Department (representing field offices)

Identified a need for Juvenile probation have more access to DCS clinical, education and nursing teams;

Services for parents with substance abuse issues be available to Probation; Equine Services and looking at more specific types of services/treatments that can be offered.

Angela Olvera-Allen County Probation


Identified community needs a secure facility for kids with severe psychosis; Currently no ability to start a child on medication; Also identified a need for treatment providers to have the ability to test for spice.

Heidi Simms-SCAN

Lack of therapists continues to be a barrier to providing services; FCM's are having difficulty with service mapping and being able to get the services they believe the family needs.

Kris Wise-SCAN

Identified shortage of therapists hinders providers' ability to provide services. Lake of consistent CFTM's on comprehensive cases; Limited in-patient substance abuse treatment; need to have a consistent approach to trauma informed care.



Indiana Community Partners for Child Safety (CPCS) A Look at Initial Family Needs and Referrals over the Course of Service SFY 2015

There are three PDF Documents that hold information regarding family needs and referrals for prevention services. The information is presented by the aggregate data, per region for SFY 2015.

CPCS Needs Assessment SFY 2015

The Needs Assessment is filled out by the client during initial contacts. The Needs Assessment asks the client about their own current needs for which they would like to receive further information.

The Needs Assessment File has two charts on four pages. The information is presented by region (in each column). The first chart (on pages one and two) is titled "Needs Assessment Region Count FY 2015" and shows the raw counts ("n") of people who indicated the need for information about a problem/topic on the needs assessment. The second chart (on pages three and four) is titled "Needs Assessment Region Percentage FY 2015" which shows the percentages of people who indicated that the need for information about a problem/topic asked on the needs assessment.

NCFAS SFY 2015

This PDF shows information having to do with the North Carolina Family Assessment Scale (NCFAS). Families show a need in the area when the staff rate them as -1, -2, or -3 on a scale of -3 to 2. The data in the Excel sheet show the percentage of families who are rated as having a need in the specified area. The Liaison administers the NCFAS twice during the time of service. The data presented is from the initial assessment, which should be administered at the beginning of service for the family. The Liaison fills out the NCFAS, rating the family on their functioning in 8 areas, based on all information they have gathered from the family. The Liaison also reaffirms the accuracy of the ratings on the initial NCFAS when they do the exit NCFAS (after at least 8 face to face contacts). The Liaison can edit ratings as necessary to provide an accurate view of the family upon initiation of service (at any time).

• CPCS Referrals SFY 2015

This PDF identifies referrals for additional services made for families by Community Partners for Child Safety programs during SFY 2015. The percentage indicated is the percent of families who had contact with the Community Partners for Child Safety program during SFY 2015.






Maltreatment After Involvement: Region 4




